#### 1. ECONOMIC ANALYSIS

Stephen Pool, economic analyst with EMSI Burning Glass, provided a review of economic data for Northeast Community College. A final copy of the economic impact report, illustrating the impact that Northeast makes on its 20-county service area, will be provided to the members of the Board of Governors.

#### 2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Chairperson Julie Robinson convened the meeting at 12:38 p.m. and led the assembly in pledging their allegiance to the flag of the United States of America.

3. To be respectful of the schedules of the meeting attendees, Chairperson Robinson advised that today's agenda would be reorganized, and next item of business would be the President's Update, followed by the climate survey results, and the open meeting public comment period.

  - Search is underway for the Vice President of Educational Services. Interviews will be held on campus in the coming weeks.
  - Capital budget 2% levy assessment does not cover new construction or additions to current buildings, or extensive one-time costs that are needed for buildings that are at the end of their life cycle. Working with other community colleges to seek support from Nebraska's legislature to provide some flexibility with levy.
  - LR 335 was passed by the Unicameral in April. LR 335 encourages Nebraska's postsecondary educational institutions to adopt the seventy percent attainment goal; 70% of Nebraskans, aged 25 to 34, to hold a degree, certificate, diploma, or other

credential by 2030. A Resolution supporting LR 335 will be considered later in the meeting.

### 4.1.1 <u>Climate survey report</u>

Jessica Dvorak and Lori Trowbridge provided a review of the Title IX Climate results from the survey administered in Spring 2022. The internal survey contained both the employee Title IX and Northeast Campus Climate survey questions. 202 people responded to the survey. This is compared to 275 people who responded to the Fall 2020 Pace Climate Survey.

The survey was 43 pages long and began with the Title IX survey that covered areas of general perception of campus security and school leadership, school leadership climate for sexual harassment and sexual assault prevention, participation in training, awareness and perceived fairness of school sexual assault policy and resources, sexual assault reporting, and bystander behavior. The campus climate section of the survey covered areas of school connectedness, guided pathways, and security and leadership. Review was given to the three sections of the campus climate along with weighted averages. Examples of qualitative comments were also provided.

Northeast Community College has created an Engagement Team that includes employees from across campus. The Team's purpose includes:

- Developing an environment where employees feel motivated, appreciated, energetic, and committed to their work.
- Promote interaction and trust between administration, leadership, and employees.
- Seek to understand and appreciate different perspectives.
- Address employee concerns and issues.
- Encourage, celebrate, and recognize employees.
- Actively solicit employee feedback, evaluate, and recommend strategies for improving employee engagement.
- Review and assess employee engagement survey results.
- Recommend appropriate actions to address priorities for change.

A recommendation of the Engagement Team is that future surveys should be split into the Title IX survey and the Campus Climate Survey.

Board members inquired if the survey is broken out by division and/or location in an effort to identify where topics need to be addressed. The low number of respondents and comments also makes it a challenge to glean any information from the survey. Ms. Dvorak indicated that the intent of the internal Campus Climate Survey was to capture a high-level pulse of the climate and should not be compared to the PACE Climate Survey. The PACE Climate Survey will again be administered in 2023. The Campus Climate Survey will again be administered in off years of the PACE Survey.

#### 5. OPEN MEETING-PUBLIC COMMENT

Chairperson Robinson noted that a copy of the Open Meetings Law is posted on the table at the back of the meeting room. One person asked to address the board regarding the Climate Survey.

Matt McCarthy said he was appreciative that the comments and survey results were published in the Employee Newsletter. He said faculty and staff are dedicated people who are concerned about the environment; they want to come to work and enjoy what they do. He went on to say that they have no hidden agenda, and they want to educate students in the best environment and facilities possible. The response rate is a concern to Mr. McCarthy as he feels it may represent apathy. He encouraged Board members to read the comments and welcomed them to ask questions of him or others. He extended his appreciation to Jessica Dvorak and the data analytics team for their work on compiling the survey results and comments and thanked the administration for publishing the same.

Chairperson Robinson advised Mr. McCarthy that his comments would be taken under advisement.

#### 8. BOARD EDUCATION AND INFORMATION

- 8.1 <u>Administrative Services Report</u>
  - 8.1.1 Monthly Financial Report and Paid Bills

Brief review of the Monthly Financial Statement. Detail was provided on the items of significance within the paid bills report. The increase in fund balances for the scholarships and financial aid is due to the drawn down of Pell Grant funds and receipt of scholarship funds.

8.1.2 2023-2024 tuition, fees, housing, and meal plan rates

Preliminary review was given to peer and regional institutional comparative data regarding tuition and fees and housing and meal plan rates. Historically we look at how Northeast compares to other colleges, along with cost of attendance and financial needs. Meeting the needs of our students and access to education are also factors that are considered.

Additional information may be received over the next several weeks and brought forth to the November meeting as well for additional discussion and approval.

Request was made to have available at the November meeting an interactive spreadsheet where different dollar amounts could be keyed in to review the effects on the budget. Data on how the Mackenzie Scott gift funds are being used will also be provided in November.

## 10. COLLEGE REPORTS

10.1 Nebraska Open Golf Tournament

Bill Johnson, Nebraska Public Power District (NPPD) board member, and Brittney Koenig, NPPD account manager, presented a check in the amount of \$15,000 to Northeast Community College. Funds, used for scholarships awarded to students enrolled in the state's community college system, were part of the funds raised during the 31<sup>st</sup> annual Wells Fargo Open golf tournament, coordinated by NPPD, and held at the Elks Country Club in Columbus in September. Over the 31 years that the tournament has been held \$1,863,321 has been raised cumulatively, with Northeast receiving a total of \$371,160 over the life of this golf tournament.

- 10.2 Student Leadership Association (SLA) Report
  - SLA retreat was held in October with many team building exercises/opportunities.
  - Signature project for the year will be a fun run. SLA has not yet identified what the raised funds will be used for.

## 12.1 Governance Committee

- The Governance Committee met via Zoom on October 5th.
- Policy content review was conducted on E-00, Ends, EL-08, Communication and Support to Board, and BPD-03, Delegation to the President. While no suggestion for revisions to the aforementioned, it is noted that improvements need to be made with the Board of Governors Teams access. The Governance Committee also recommends that a retreat be held in the February/March timeframe, using the E-00, Ends Monitoring Report as the basis for the retreat.
- Board Self-Evaluation was conducted on BPD-08, <u>Delegation to the President</u>.
   While current board policies are being incorporated into either a new
   Administrative Procedure (AP), an Executive Limitation (EL), Board President
   Delegation (BPD), or Governance Process (GP) policy. The Board established
   the groundwork, and the president uses reasonable interpretation of what the
   board developed to determine procedures. If the Board changes policy, the
   President would need to change procedure.
- BP-3233, <u>Alcoholic Beverages and Controlled Substances-Employees</u> is being recommended for deletion. This policy is covered under AP-3233.0, <u>Alcoholic Beverages and Controlled Substances-Employees</u>; as well as EL-01, <u>Treatment of Students</u>; and EL-03, <u>Treatment of Employees</u>.
- A crosswalk spreadsheet has been created to reflect where deleted policies are covered in either a new policy (EL, GP, or BPD) or an administrative procedure. This crosswalk is available for reference within the Teams site.
